Salma Ataya

Salma Ataya is a dancer and choreographer, who started dancing at the age of ten. She was first introduced to Dabkeh (Palestinian traditional dance) then to contemporary dance at Sareyyet Ramallah Dance Company. Salma took part in local and international performances such as: Femme, Orleans Theatre (2019, France), Cloud Study, John Scott Company (2018, Ireland), La Même, Salma Ataya and Farah Saleh (2016, Palestine), Area Y, Christophersen-Siljeholm (2015, Norway), Badke, les ballets C de la B, KVS, A.M. Qattan Foundation (2013, Belgium), Ordinary Madness, Sareyyet Ramallah Dance Company (2012, Palestine), Sandwichet Labaneh, Sarreyet Ramallah Dance Company (2011, Palestine). She has also been teaching dance since 2010 and has finished her Masters in Contemporary Dance in 2017 at the University of Limerick in Ireland, where she is now based.

Dance Artist in Residence for Co. Her choreographies include the 2008 Irish Times Theatre Award Best Production winner Phaedra's Love, A Midsummers Night Dream and Anatomy of a Seagull for Loose Canon Theatre Company, Only an Apple, Comedy of Errors, Big Love, Romeo & Juliet and Woman and Scarecrow for The Abbey Theatre, Wedding Day of the Cro-Magnons for Bedrock, Macbeth, Shutter and Titus Andronicus for Siren Productions, Adaptation of a Meeting and Behindtheeyeliesbone for Myriad Dance Company, Don Gregorio and Transformations for Wexford Festival Opera and Sweeney Todd for The Gate Theatre, 100 feet (dance film) for Projects Arts Centre and most recently The Fall for Ella Clarke Choreography. Between 2004 and 2011, Ella co-founded and directed Genesis Project and Collective, a practise-based project for radicalisation in the art form of dance with centres of practice in Dublin, Philadelphia, Brooklyn and L.A. She has adapted and performed four of eminent experimental choreographer Deborah Hay's solo works and commissioned, produced and performed her trio A Lost Opera with Genesis Collective.

Born in 2004, Kama Bugala has trained in Irish, Contemporary Dance and RAD Ballet. Since 2016 she has been a member of Dublin Youth Dance Company and recently began training in Aerial Hoop at Tribe Fitness Dance Studio. After graduating Millie moved to Budapest to take part in an 'Elite training programme' with Budapest Dance Theatre. Aoife McAtamney

Aoife McAtamney is a freelance choreographer, contemporary dancer and songwriter based in Dublin. She studied in London and Germany, completing apprentisceships with four prolific choreographers including William Forsythe and Wayne McGregor. Aoife danced with company T.R.A.S.H (NL) and choreographers Regina Van Berkle (GER), Emma Martin, John Scott, Fearghus O'Conchuir, Annieke Hansen (US) and Sara Rudner (US. Her choreography includes 'SWEETHEART THAT'S THE INTERESTING PART' and 'WHAT'S THE MATTER?'. Collaborations with Nina Vallon and Ioannis Mandafounis created two duets 'EGG CHARADE' and 'ONE ONE'. 'OSSIP MANDELSTAM A PERFORMANCE' is her second creation with Swiss company Cie Ioannis Mandafounis. Aoife has numerous awards from the Arts Council of Ireland and Culture Ireland. She was an associate artist of Dance Ireland, a Carte Blanche artist and an Aerowaves selected artist for 2014 touring her solo "SOFTER SWELLS". Her ongoing collaborators include "PINK BREATH" with musician Shane Holly and theatre performances with Zoe Ni Riordain.

Mary Nunan

Mary Nunan is a contemporary dance artist – choreographer, performer. Her professional career began when she joined Ireland's first state funded contemporary dance company: Dublin Contemporary Dance Theatre (1981-86). She was founder Artistic Director of Daghdha Dance Company (1988-1999) and she was a collaborative artist/ performer in a number of works choreographed by Yoshiko Chuma (2000-2003).

Throughout her career Mary has created a substantial body of critically acclaimed solo and ensemble choreographies that have been performed in national and international venues: including London (South Bank), Berlin (Podweil Theatre), Munich (Dance '95), Paris (Pompidou Centre) and Guanajuato (Festival Cervantino), Mexico. The screen adaptation of her dance-theatre work 'Territorial Claims' was selected for screening at the Lincoln Centre's Dance-for-Camera Festival in New York City (1998). She was involved as a collaborative artist and performer in the Maya Lila Collective, under the direction of Joan Davis (2002-14). Recent ensemble improvised performances include Rewriting Distance, Limerick (2016), in collaboration with Lin Snelling and Guy Cools and 'Tilting' (2017), with Isabella Oberlander and Mary Wycherley: the latter premiered at Limerick City Gallery of Art and toured to Royal Hibernian Academy Gallery, Dublin. Her most recent solo The Movement 2 (2019) was premiered at the 92nd Y in NYC and also performed in Project Arts Centre, Dublin, as part of a programme curated by John Scott; Irish Modern Dance Theatre.

Mary was the first Course Director of the MA Contemporary Dance Performance at the University of Limerick (1999-2016). She was a visiting guest tutor at the RCA, London (2016 -17). She earned her PhD from Middlesex University in 2013. She has published a number of articles on the process of creating choreographic works.

Liv O'Donoghue

Liv O'Donoghue is an actor based in Dublin. She started out at The National Performing Arts School (The Factory) in Dublin, before moving to the UK to pursue a training in dance and performance. Since graduating, Liv has worked with a number of theatre directors and choreographers, touring across Europe, the USA and Australia. Since turning her focus to acting in 2015, Liv has been a core collaborator with Dead Centre, originating the role of Josephine in Lippy in 2013. Lippy has toured extensively since then, including The Traverse (Edinburgh), Young Vic (London), Abrons Arts Centre (New York) and the Schaubuehne (Berlin), among others. She most recently played the role of Gloria in The Patient Gloria directed by John McIlduff for the Dublin Theatre Festival. The show then toured to the Traverse Theatre for the Edinburgh Fringe where it won both a Herald Angel award and a Scotsman Fringe First. There are further dates in the pipeline for 2020. Liv is currently developing two new short films with directors Maeve Stone and Alex Gill and is studying under Helena Walsh voice coach.

Emma O'Kane

Emma is a freelance dance artist and choreographer. She trained at the Perm State Choreographic Academy, Russia. Emma has been a member of CoisCéim Dance Theatre since 2001 and recently performed BODY LANGUAGE at the RHA and toured Australia with THE WOLF AND PETER. Dance Europe voted Emma Outstanding Dancer Of The Year for her performance in CoisCéim's production of FAUN. She is a regular collaborator with ANU Productions and recently worked on THE SIN EATERS, Dublin Theatre Festival. Other performance/ choreographic credits include The Abbey Theatre, Fishamble, Prime Cut Productions. She has an MA in Dance from the University of Limerick.
